SPECTATOR INFORMATION

FRIDAY OCTOBER 19th

Scrutineering and documentation will take place at Meirion Motors premises in Park Avenue, Aberystwyth from 6p.m. to 8.30p.m. when you can see the cars being checked over.

SATURDAY OCTOBER 20th

The rally will start from the promenade in Marine Terrace with the cars departing at 1 minute intervals from 9.15a.m. A commentary on the leading crews and their cars will be provided. This year the main spectator stage will be located in the Dyfi (Dovey) forest, entrance at map reference 124/846099 and visitors will be able to see the competitors passing the viewing point at approximately 10.15a.m. and again at 2.30p.m.

Spectators will also be welcome in the Dyfnant forest where the first car is due around noon. Please enter the forest at 125/019133.

This year the service area, where cars will stop for approximately 25 minutes will be at the minicipal car park in Machynlleth with the first crews expected at around 11am. Spectators should note there is no parking space in the service area and they should use the side streets around the area subject to the usual Road Traffic regulations. The Rally is expected to finish around 4.30p.m. when the cars begin to arrive back in Aberystwyth and the leading five competitors will be scheduled to line up in their final positions for interviews close to the Shell Oils caravan parked opposite the Belle Vue Hotel.

DO'S AND DONT'S - IMPORTANT

Wolverhampton & South Staffs Car Club Ltd. wish to draw the attention of all visitors to the Audi Sport National Rally to the following notes which are printed for your guidance and the club hope you will be good enough to comply with them as the future of rallying depends very much on the responsible behaviour of spectators and competitors alike.

Remember first of all that rally cars will often be reaching speeds in excess of 100mph and on forest surfaces, particularly in the wet, the margin of error is very small indeed. By following the simple rules set out you will be doing your bit to make the event safe and enjoyable for everyone.

DO NOT— Stand in prohibited areas which are clearly marked.

Stand on the outside of corner or piles of logs or anything else.

Obstruct escape routes which are clearly marked.

Stand in front of directional arrows or any signs helpful to competitors.

Park your car where it will cause obstruction or annoyance.

Stand in front of tree lines on stages.

Use minor roads being used by rally traffic.

Obstruct competitors and service crews at service areas.

Cause annoyance by driving at high speed on public roads.

Walk along stages when competitors are approaching.

Pull down fences, gates, trees or anything else.

PLEASE — Follow marshalls instructions — they are for your benefit.

Keep children under supervision at all times.

Keep dogs on a secure leash at all times.

Drive carefully when leaving stages.

Arrive early at spectator stages.

Take your litter home with you when you leave.

Remember to treat local residents with consideration and courtesy.

FIGHT TO THE FINISH




Louise Aitken-Walker, the lass from Duns, has been the most consistent driver of the entire series and she starts the last event with a narrow five point lead in her R.E.D. Sierra Turbo development car which has been getting better all through the season.

Behind her is Phil Collins, the extrovert Hereford star in his GM Dealersport supported Opel Manta who has won three of the eight events so far and only two points behind him and making a late bid for the title is the Haverfordwest farmer David Llewellin who will certainly not be short of support both during and after the event for it is rumoured the whole of Pembrokeshire is taking the day off to support the best Welsh hope for top honours for a few years.

Round 1: Skip Brown Gwynedd Rally: March 10th

The 1983 Championship winner Darryl Weidner started where he left off by taking victory on the opening round. His Audi 80 Quattro was not ready and so 'old faithful' Big Banger was once again pressed into service. Phil Collins was runner—up for the second successive year and the find of the 1983 season David Llewellin was third.

Tim Brise' Talbot Sunbeam, entered by rally sponsor Skip Brown, won Group A but top registered Group A driver John Midgley took the points in his immaculate Toyota Corolla

Round 2: York National Rally: March 31st

Mr Weidner's new car made its debut but was somewhat upstaged by the appearance of Austin Rover's Metro 6R4 in the hands of Tony Pond. However the Metro, quick though it was, did not last the distance retiring with alternator failure thus handing victory to Weidner whose determined drive in a strange car gave him his second maximum score. Allan Edwards' rear wheel d rive Escort was second and Louise Aitken's RED Sierra a fine third. John Midgley again took Group A finishing an excellent fourth overall.

Round 3: John Clark BMW Granite City Rally: April 14th

Darry Weidner's run of good fortune came to a very abrupt end with an accident which wrote off his new car. Ken Wood's Rover Vitesse scored

its first national championship win followed by the Escort of Bill Lymburn also having his best run to date. Donald Heggie was third and, by finishing fourth, Louise Aitken took the lead in the championship—the first time a woman has done so. John Midgley made it three in a row in Group A.

Round 4: Rothmans Manx Stages: May 12th

Phil Collins again stamped his authority on the event by taking the lead on the first stage and maintaining it to the finish. However on the last but one stage his Manta's propshaft began to give trouble and he tackled the last stage at a maximum of 50mph. Second overall was Mike Pattison

in his recently acquired ex-Malcolm Wilson Escort G3 and third was Bill Dobie who finished the event in a cloud of smoke and with a very sick engine.

Round 5: Peter Russek Manuals Rally: August 4th.

The first wet Russek for many years provided David Llewellin with a very popular win in a hired Escort. Louise Aitken and Ellen Morgan had to settle for second this time but maintained their lead in the championship.. Third was local man Bob Fowden in his Rover Vitesse.

In Group A Graham Elsmore beat John Midgley by half a minute in the battle of the Toyota Corollas.



Round 6: Rally Radio Link Mewla Stages' August 26th

Phil Collins confirmed his supremacy on tarmac by taking the laurels on this thrash over the Epynt ranges. Second was Mike Pattison's G 3 Escort, just in front of Tony Pond's Metro 6R4 recording his first finish in three attempts.

Group A again fell to Graham Elsmore who was almost two minutes up on Midgley by the end of the day.

Round 7: Newcastle Moat House Lindisfarne Rally: September 1st

For the second time in six days Phil Collins had the first swig of the champagne after winning his first forest event in the Shell Oils series. After the demise of early leader Allan Edwards' four wheel drive Escort, Phil recorded a string of fastest stage times to finish in front of Roger Chilean's Escort and Louise Aitken—Walker's Sierra. With Graham Elsmore absent John Midgely won Group A and so confirmed himself as Group A champion with two events still remaining.

Round 8: Andrews Heat for Hire Cumbria Rally: September 29/30th

National Rally Champion in 1978 and 1979 Malcolm Wilson brought his Audi Quattro to his local event and was rewarded with a fine win after the demise of Tony Pond's Metro. Highest championship points scorer was David Llewellin whose Nissan finished in second place with Roger Chilman again third.

Louise Aitken—Walker retired and Phil Collins took a maximum on one stage and eventually finished 19th. These two and Llewellin come to the Audi Sport National Rally knowing that one of them will be the champion but which one
